Church policy statement issued by the Church Council

*same letter emailed & sent to members

Dear Members of United Methodist Church of Mount Vernon,

Many of you have been looking for an update from the church about decisions and the timing for an all-church meeting related to the matters at hand on the Way Forward and the positioning of the Traditional Plan. We hope you have stayed aware of the many issues facing the global church at this continued moment as we have tried to be diligent in updating and informing as developments occur. There certainly is a lot you can read. This letter offers the latest to you as part of the church at large.

First of all, as you know, the Church Council, which is the local church's administrative leadership, released a letter of vision following what is now referred to as #GC2019 in April. Since then, two ballots have been conducted to establish a policy statement for how this church views the action results from #GC2019. Passing in both ballots and forms, the Council is now prepared to share with the church what this policy is and to ask for vote on the support.

On September 8th, everyone in the congregation will be encouraged to attend a meeting where the policy statement included with this letter, as adopted by the Council, will be presented to the church for support. In preparation for this meeting, we did a church wide survey and it has been concluded. It gave great input ahead of the Sept 8th meeting. The survey may also shed light on what additional preparation the congregation needs to come together as a community in this process. To help with your thought process, the following is the known set of dates set for the coming months:

- January 1st, 2020—official date for initiating enforcement of what is now referred to as the "Traditional Plan" toward pastors and bishops is able to take place.
- May of 2020—the next General Conference (global), regularly scheduled every 4 years where further discussion of the future of the UMC will take place. Jim Baty, our current Church Council chair, has been elected to be an alternate to this event and a delegate to the jurisdictional conference.
- June of 2020—the next Iowa Annual Conference takes place where churches impacted by the outcome of #GC2019, pending #GC2020, may request being granted leave by the conference.
- July of 2020—The North Central Jurisdictional Conference will take place where policies of enforcement, election of bishops and other matters will be taken up that each Annual Conference is to follow.

The policy set by the Church Council in its second ballot effort, replacing the May ballot action as described above is as follows and is the proposed policy statement of the Church in relation to the effects of #GC2019.

RESOLUTION: DISAPPROVAL OF THE TRADITIONAL PLAN

WHEREAS, "Our Theological Task" (see ¶105, p.80-91) invites and encourages us to continuously engage in faithful and serious reflection on our biblical and theological inheritance and celebrates "The wonder of God's grace at work with us and among us," and has led the people called United Methodists to demonstrate nuanced and robust understandings about matters as diverse as divorce and the ordination of women, and in that spirit rejecting literalism that harms or excludes LGBTQ+ persons;

WHEREAS, despite no biblical mandate to discriminate against LGBTQ+ persons, The United Methodist Church has singled out LGBTQ+ persons for punitive action, while seemingly ignoring biblical teachings on matters such as efforts to secure pensions (Matthew 6:19-20);

WHEREAS, our first General Rule (¶104, p.78) concerns "doing no harm";

WHEREAS, United Methodists with diverse theological appreciations all earnestly vow "to resist evil, injustice, and oppression in whatever forms they present themselves" (United Methodist Hymnal, p. 34);

WHEREAS, ¶613.19 prohibits annual conference funds from being used to "violate the expressed commitment of the UMC 'not to reject or condemn lesbian and gay members and friends'"; and

WHEREAS, by adopting elements of the Traditional Plan, we have done great harm to our LGBTQ+ siblings.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, we express disapproval of the Traditional Plan and apologize for the harm inflicted on LGBTQ+ persons, their families, and the body of Christ. We "affirm that all persons are individuals of sacred worth, created in the image of God," (¶161.G) and assert that no human being is incompatible with Christian teaching.

FURTHER, BE IT RESOLVED, in light of the current IAC budget crisis and the impact of fewer churches paying full apportionments, we urge that the IAC should prioritize the full funding of conference missions, new ministry starts, and clergy support before funds or monies shall be expended for background investigations, complaints, just resolutions, or clergy trials pertaining to LGBTQ+ ordination and marriage.

[Note: this last paragraph is currently being reviewed by judicial council.]

These are the major elements that we are able to update you with at this time. We encourage you to do all that you can to become and remain informed. One way of doing so is to seek out a member(s) of the Church Council and talk openly about any interest, concerns or positions you may have. Come, have your voice be heard.

Scrip Update - BACK TO SCHOOL IS A GREAT TIME TO USE SCRIP CARDS!



Our pathway provides opportunities, direction and resources to help anyone discover and grow in faith according to our calling to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.



August Anniversaries



DID YOU KNOW?....

By the late 1850's, there had been a great revival of religion in Mount Vernon and "the town was cleared of gamblers and liquor." The population of the town was rapidly increasing. The Centennial History of Mount Vernon notes "There was an evident increase in refinement and Christian graces throughout the community. A Methodist Sunday school was organized and called the Evergreen Sunday School because it continued for twelve months of the year."

Much of this growth was attributed to Rev. A. B. Kendig, originally one of the Circuit Riders. He was gifted with great eloquence and "learned sermons", bringing in 70 new members. Apparently, his reputation was widespread because he eventually became one of the greatest pastors in Boston history!

The brick church at the east end of town was now too small for its congregation and it was sold to the school board. In 1860, the Methodists purchased two lots three blocks west of the original church but still on the Main Street of town. Church leaders still wanted to have a vital presence in the community but to be closer to the emerging new college and seminary.

By 1865, a new brick church was ready for worship. This church, 40 X 70 feet with two stories and an imposing spire sat on the west side of the alley between the two lots. The cost was \$7800, including the lots, and the contractor was William Brackett. Its seating capacity was 550 persons.

The new furnishings and inside décor were completed in 1867 and paid for by the Ladies Aid Society who raised its cost of \$892.18. A parsonage was built in 1874 on the lot east of the church. It is also noted that two of the parishioners assumed over \$1,000 of unpaid obligations (a hefty sum in those days!) on the church property.

Next month will be a description of this new church which reminded all of a New England meeting house, including a library of several hundred volumes and carved walnut stairways from the balconies to the main floor.

Endowment update Second quarter 2019

The church's endowment funds, most of which are managed by the Iowa United Methodist Foundation, totaled about \$223,000 at the end of the second quarter (June 30, 2019), the value having been enhanced by generally favorable market conditions since the first of the year. Included in the endowment assets is a fund dedicated specifically to the maintenance of the organ, at the request of its donor. The endowment committee voted at its most recent meeting to use \$2500 of this fund to pay the insurance deductible incurred as a result of the claim filed to repair the damage to the organ caused by last winter's roof leak. Because our endowment funds were available to cover this expense, other church assets did not have to be used—another example of the blessing that is our endowment. It should be noted that, no matter what the outcome of the current uncertainty affecting all United Methodist churches, our endowment assets belong to us, just as the building, parsonage, and other property do. The Iowa United Methodist Foundation has already taken steps to maintain its ability to manage assets for all churches, no matter what their denominational affiliations, so it will remain an option for the management of our endowment funds. The Endowment Ministry Team fully accepts bequests and other legacy gifts from members and friends of the church. A gift to endowment "keeps on giving," since the principal of the endowment is never spent; only a portion of the income is distributed, so that the endowment funds can support the church in perpetuity, leaving a legacy to our children's children. Endowment is forever!
